Alone by Megan E Freeman

Adventure/Survival story written entirely in verse is about a girl named Maddie who is left behind for 3 years when her town is evacuated during a mysterious emergency. She has to figure out how to survive when she's totally on her own.



Ghost Girl by Ally Malinenko

This horror story is about a girl named Zee who LOVES ghost stories, but never imagined she'd be living in one. Zee and her friends must work together to give their ghost story a happy ending.



Amari and the Night Brothers by BB Alston

First book in the Supernatural Investigations series follows Amari as she is thrown into a world she didn't even know existed, but has to figure out quickly if she wants to rescue her missing brother.



We Are Family by LeBron James

When Jayden Carr discovers the afterschool basketball program Hoop Group is no longer happening he feels heartbroken, and he's not alone. Determined to prove themselves, Jayden and the other players fight for their chance to show what they've got.



Class Act by Jerry Craft

This Graphic Novel is the 2nd book in the New Kid series and follows 8th grader Drew as he tries to keep his friend group together and become the person he wants to be. The story follows the ups and downs as he navigates being one of the only kids of color in a prestigious private school.



Tristan Strong Punches a Hole in the Sky by: Kwame Mbalia

This is the 1st book in the Tristan Strong Series and follows Tristan as he recovers from his best friends death by staying at his grandparent's farm, where he accidently opens a chasm into a whole new world he never knew existed. Tristan has to fight alongside black American gods like John Henry to save the world and get home.



The Deep & Dark Blue by Niki Smith

In this graphic novel we follow siblings Hawke and Grayson as they escape the political uprising that destroyed their family. They find themselves in hiding and have to decide when to take back their old lives, or if they want to stay where they are and live a new and different life.




LISA FIPPS Starfish by Lisa Fipps




The following books are for 8th graders only



Me (Moth) by Amber McBride

After losing her whole family in an accident, Moth feels lost and alone, until she meets Sani who is searching for his roots. They set off on a road trip chasing ghosts and ancestors. Along the way they might just find themselves. This novel in verse is both a coming of age story and a ghost story.



The Rose that Grew from Concrete by Tupac Shakur

Written in Tupac's own hand from the time he was nineteen, these seventy-two poems embrace his spirit, his energy—and his ultimate message of hope. This collection of more than 100 poems honestly & artfully confronts a range of topics from poverty to motherhood and more.



Dear Justyce by Nic Stone

In the second book of the Dear Martin series, incarcerated teen Quan writes letters to Justyce about his experience in the American Prison system. Through both the letters and flashbacks, Quan's story emerges, taking an unflinching look at the flawed practices and ideologies of the American justice system.

Activity Descriptions Match the number on the board to the description below


- 1. Read a book to a sibling or friend!
- 2. Draw your favorite character from your book. If it is a graphic novel or picture book, copy the character onto a blank page. If it is a chapter book, focus on the details used to describe the character to imagine what they look like and do your best to draw them!
- 3. Create a one-page mini poster about your book by drawing a picture. Title the page on top and include details from the story. This can be based on a scene, a chapter, a character, or the whole story!
- 4. Create your own bookmark- creating a scene from a book. Use the template in the packet or fold your paper in half and then in half again to create 4 sections for 4 different bookmark ideas!
- 5. Find a quiet place to read- outside, your bedroom, the park... (check with an adult for permission before heading out)
- 6. Cook a recipe from the cookbook and write a review! (check with an adult for permission before cooking!)


The review can include:

- Was it easy to make?
- What was hard about the recipe?
- How did it taste?
- What could you have done differently?
- Would you add any other ingredients that were not listed?
- Would you make it again? Share a book with a friend. Talk to them about your story and book, read with them or let them help you with some of the activities!
- 7. Share a book with a friend. Talk to them about your story and book, read with them or let them help you with some of the activities!
- 8. Go to the public library and get a library card- IT IS FREE!!!!! (check with an adult for permission before going)
- 9. Create a vision board using pictures from magazines. (check with an adult for permission before cutting anything!) If you want your vision board to relate to your story:
 - Find photos, colors, or objects that remind you of your character!
 - What things remind you of your book (the people, the setting, the ideas)?
 - If you want to make a regular summer vision board:
- Find photos, colors, or objects that make you feel happy, motivated, inspired or calm. Then create a collage of those things to inspire you everyday towards those feelings.
- 10. (Search and Rescue) Make a pile of books you may owe to any SCSD school. It is okay if they are not yours! You can still bring them back!
- 11. Create your own recipe and share or cook at home! If we get enough recipes, we can make a school wide student cookbook! (check with an adult for permission before you start cooking)
- 12. Use the drawing book to create your own comic strip or graphic novel. It can be as long or as short as you would like. To make it easy, you can fold up a piece of paper and create spaces for every new scene!

HOW TO USE THE SORA BY OVERDRIVE APP!



WITH SORA YOU CAN CHECK OUT AND READ EBOOKS AND AUDIOBOOKS FROM OUR SCHOOL DISTRICT.

ONCE YOU ARE LOGGED IN YOU CAN ACCESS HUNDREDS OF BOOKS, BY SEARCHING FOR SPECIFIC TITLES OR EXPLORING POPULAR SUBJECTS.



WHEN YOU FIND A BOOK YOU WOULD LIKE TO READ, YOU MAY EITHER CLICK "BORROW" IF IT IS IMMEDIATELY AVAILABLE OR SELECT "PLACE HOLD" IF IT IS CURRENTLY CHECKED OUT, SO THAT YOU MAY READ IT WHEN IT BECOMES AVAILABLE.



GO TO YOUR SHELF TO SELECT BOOKS THAT YOU ARE BORROWING AND TO RETURN THEM WHEN YOU ARE FINISHED.





Tips to find the PERFECT book!



- 1. Log onto Sora
- 2. Click on the Explore button
- 3. Use the search button at the top of the page to search for a specific title, author, or subject.
- 4. You can also scroll down to see clickable categories under Popular Subjects section
- 5. Click Explore All Subjects to see a full list or keep scrolling down to see other categories
- 6. You can also click on Preferences to identify your specific preferences and formats (ie. ebooks, audiobooks)
- 7. You can click on Collections to browse different categories
- 8. Once you spot an ebook or audiobook that looks interesting or that you want to read, click on the picture of the book cover.
- 9. After you can see information about the ebook/audiobook
- 10. In the middle section of the page, you can read the summary of the ebook/audiobook.
- 11. Under the picture of the book cover, there is sometimes an option to click on the Read Sample button to see a few of the book's pages
- 12. If you are interested in finding similar ebooks/audiobooks there are clickable options under the book information, including books of the same genre.
- 13. If you want to read the book click on the Borrow button to "check it out" for 2 weeks. There is a Renew button if you need longer than 2 weeks to finish the ebook/audiobook.
- 14. If the book is not currently available you can click on the Place Hold button to get a chance to "check it out" when it is available.
- 15. Enjoy! When you are done and want to return the ebook/audiobook click on the Return button.
