Flag Football Teams Open Doors for Female Athletes



New this year, several dozen girls from all SCSD high schools represent the **Syracuse East** and **Syracuse West** flag football teams. Each day after school, the teams engage in warm up activities, then move into agility work. Then routes, then a rotating focus on either offense or defense before their daily scrimmage.

The teams practice every day, where they learn the game, watch film... everything that a professional football team would do to prepare. Thanks to a grant from Dick's Sporting Goods, the teams all received equipment, uniforms, and other necessities.

"I've only ever done running sports like track and cross country," **Nottingham** senior **Azaria White**, a wide receiver, explained. "So the hand-eye coordination



is new and tough! I had no knowledge of football coming in, so there's been a lot of learning. I've been working hard at studying the play book! I'm excited to tell people I'm one of the first... I have to give myself props for that!"

For student athletes, their excitement stems not only from being the first to try something – but also from the camaraderie that the football experience has created with loved ones.

"I know a lot of people who play football," **ITC** senior **Treasure Taylor** said. "My cousin played D1, and my brother played. It's really fun! I like running the plays, and catching the ball is so fun! I'm a receiver. I already know what most of the routes are – I've had to learn particular rules like how to defend. I follow the offensive playbook! I know we'll have a lot of eyes on us... so I hope we'll be good!"

"I'm a Bills fan, and my family is all huge Bills fans... so I had to try it out!" **Corcoran** senior **Caroline Menon** shared. "I'm the quarterback, and it's a lot harder than I expected! Flag rules mean you only get one second to throw the ball! Being a point guard in basketball has helped me with that. It's awesome – a good way for us girls to break the stigma that women's sports are 'easy' – flag is way harder than regular football!"

The SCSD Athletics Department continues to prioritize increasing participation in sports. Next winter, they hope to introduce girl's wrestling, if there is enough interest!

Brilliant Young Minds Book Club The 100 Black Men Brilliant Young Minds Book Club at Syracuse Latin, now in its second year in the building, focuses on helping 4th, 5th, and 6th grade boys develop a love for literature. Through weekly meetings during the

school day, the group mentors boys through both individual and group reading time.

"Reading is fundamental – things are in books for a reason," **Syracuse Latin** 5th grade student **Ian Owens** shared. "Something about this group screamed out to me: it'll be beneficial to me! It's really helped me. The group is really helpful because with all the struggles and adversity in the world right now, it's important for us to learn about our history and our culture, so when we go out into the world, we're not lost."



Book Buddies

The Book Buddies program, organized through the United Way of Central New York, operates in five SCSD schools this year – **Delaware**, **Dr. Weeks**, **Roberts**, **Seymour**, and **STEAM at Dr. King** – serving about 500 students.

Book Buddies aims to provide one-on-one literacy support to students. Each week, a volunteer reads with a student for half an hour during the school lunch period, working with students to encourage them to read at their own pace and develop reading skills and improve their language and comprehension. The program also provides student participants with free books throughout the school year that they are able to keep, to help encourage literacy at home.

"This is actually a thin piece of metal that my engineering teacher had," **ITC** Electrical Technology P-TECH senior **Zymir Douglas** shared as he held up the card. "We used Canva to make templates, and then used a machine to laser our design onto it to make unique business cards."

As Zymir made his way to different tables, he noted that there was something for everyone, representing all career fields and all CTE program areas: healthcare, engineering, finance, landscaping, food service, environmental fields, military, and more. Part time and full time work, summer employment, internships, and more were offered – with on-site applications and onsite interviews.

For those uncertain about their plans for the future, the career fair presented a great opportunity for students to be exposed to new career paths.

"This has been nice because it allows me to see where my head is – if I want to pursue college or enter right into a career," **Nottingham** senior **Johnny Teague** said. "The Career Fair showed me basically everything I need to succeed... every career I can think of! This experience is going to help me think about where I want to start out on my path to greatness."

Hearing through Hands: Syracuse STEM at Blodgett ASL Club Helps Students Learn the Language of Inclusion

'Goals,' she signed in American Sign Language (ASL).

Toya's goal is to one day become a Forensic Scientist. But this year, two to three days each week, she's spending her school lunch period in 8th grade ELA teacher (and building Diversity, Equity, and Belonging Leader) **Leeza Roper**'s classroom, practicing sign language with her peers.

Through an American Sign Language club – new this year – Ms. Roper, who is fluent in ASL herself, is helping students learn conversational sign.

8th grader **Tajin'arie Sheppard** said that new understanding was one of the reasons she was drawn to the group in the first place.

"I joined this group because sign language has always been a language I wanted to learn," Tajin'arie said. "My best friend is fluent in it, and we have lots of hearing-impaired friends, so I wanted to be able to communicate with them better."

Moving forward, Ms. Roper hopes to expand the group beyond the Syracuse STEM at Blodgett school walls... looking into organizing a field trip to visit an OCC ASL class taught by deaf professors, or inviting OCC students and professors from the program to do a workshop with her ASL group. She also hopes to see more students working toward earning the New York State Seal of Biliteracy in American Sign Language – something a few of her students are already working toward.

Syracuse Football Players Inspire SCSD Elementary and Middle School Students

Members of the Syracuse University football team visited **Brighton Academy, Ed Smith, Huntington, HW Smith, McKinley-Brighton, Meachem, Salem Hyde, STEAM at Dr. King,** and **Syracuse Latin** this spring – volunteering to read to elementary school students and answering questions from middle schoolers.

While the younger students were excited just to welcome guest readers, middle school students said the visitors really inspired them to pursue their dreams.

"When I grow up, I want to be a veterinarian," Brighton Academy

6th grader **Aubrey Moore** shared. "It inspired me to hear from the football player because he plays in college and he's made it a long way already. It inspired me because it showed me that you can actually do anything. It made me feel like I can do what I want to do. If he could get there, I can, too. If he can achieve his goal, I can do it, too."



After School Robotics Program Sparks Student Interest in STEM

SCSD elementary and middle school students are gaining STEM skills that will set them ahead in life, thanks to an after-school robotics program now in 17 schools.

The after-school robotics programs are free to students and include a full curriculum led by former teachers and STEM professionals. Units touch on the Engineering Design Process, an Introduction to Robotics, VEX Coding, Simple Machines, Pendulums and Pulleys, and more, wrapping up with a unit on aerospace and drones, as well as rockets.

"I love robotics," **Grant** 7th grader **Shafiqullah Baborai** shared. "I helped design our robot. I worked with [school robotics advisor] **Mr. Trujillo** to design the robot and make it the most effective, and then I helped build it. The hardest part was actually building it – it took



about two weeks. My favorite part is trying to program the robot so it can do things on its own... it makes me feel very



bright! I'm always working to make my robot better in the future. I hope to be an engineer one day and I feel that robotics will help prepare me."

Kaden Lemons – Syracuse **STEM at Blodgett** 6th grader has been participating in robotics since he was in elementary school.

"I've always had a thing for making stuff," he shared. "It started out as just a fun way to go on field trips! At first, I wasn't able to do much – I was just observing. But now, I've learned so much! The controls are the hardest thing to learn – things are almost reversed on them. But I love robotics. I love working as a team and trying to get the highest score!"

High School Students Jump Start Future Health Careers through Upstate Program

This year, SCSD students from **Corcoran**, **Henninger, Nottingham**, and **PSLA at Fowler** were invited to get a head start on their future, thanks to the Upstate Medical University's Jump Start Your Health Career program.

Through the ten-week paid program, students met for several hours on Saturdays on the Upstate Medical University Campus. There, led by Upstate students, faculty, and clinicians, they learned and practiced the clinical reasoning process that guides the diagnostic and treatment process. They participated in interactive learning experiences in on-campus laboratories, and used complex, realistic patient cases to explore the field of health care and health careers.

Corcoran senior **Sahrie Mcintyre** said she hopes to become a Registered Nurse one day. She hasn't taken any healthcare classes in high school, so she saw the program as a helpful opportunity to provide her with medical insight.

"It's tough sometimes to pick up the medical terminology, so I know this will be an advantage in the future when I study nursing in college and take classes like this," she shared.

Henninger Library Becomes Creative **Escape with Mysteries to Solve and Journals to Make**

A pair of sisters faced identity theft. A maid killed her employer to fund her child support. What initially looked like two unrelated suicides started looking a lot like murder. And it was Henninger students who tracked down the culprits for all three!

Thanks to two grants funded by the SCSD Educational Foundation, there are two new initiatives in the Henninger



High School Library this year. Intended to help foster community in the library and get students off their devices. Librarian Assistant Kelaiah Wolf created both a self-directed mystery "game" and a journaling space.

Through the mystery series, students are encouraged to stop in to the library during a free period or lunch break. They're given a letter as a starting point, and must identify clues to lead them through the library, finding a disguised safe, decoding Morse code, reading documents created in invisible ink, solving puzzle boxes, and more.

"We try to take the small pieces of evidence and use those to figure out the full story," Henninger junior **Charlie Armstead** said. "I like the puzzles and seeing how everything comes together in the end. I didn't really come to the library until we started doing trivia, and then I got hooked on the mysteries... it's so fun!"

For students who may not have a knack for solving

murders, the library team also developed a journaling space. Complete with blank journals and an assortment of decorating materials like maps, books and magazines for collaging, stickers, and more, students are welcome to cozy up and get creative.
